The Novi Public Library has partnered with the City of Novi Parks & Recreation Department, Novi Community School District and Novi Youth Assistance to offer a Teen Space in the West Side Meeting Room of the Novi Library on Mondays-Fridays from 2-5 pm (except during vacation breaks) during the school year. The Teen Space was created for students to "hang out" and socialize when traditional use of the Library is not needed. It is open to students in grades 7-12. This program has been a "mini-community center" SUCCESS, and has inspired teens to leverage library services, so they can enhance their learning and academic achievement.

Yes, based on financial need. Pursuant to Article 8, section 9 of the Michigan Constitution of 1963, the Legislature must provide by law for the establishment and support of public libraries. All fines assessed and paid by criminal defendants for violations of Michigan's Penal Code is turned over to county treasurers who are required by law to distribute it to public libraries in their county. I would advocate against any legislation that would divert penal fines from libraries.

Q4 Would you support increasing state aid to library funding?

The state of Michigan is responsible for funding statewide library services. In the current fiscal year, libraries received an increase of 9% over the fiscal year 2017-18 appropriations for a total of \$12.1 million to public libraries. Currently, the per capita payments amount to \$.39689 for direct and indirect state aid to public libraries. For cooperatives, the per capita is \$.39689 with a density payment of \$7.94 per square rule. State aid for libraries was reduced greatly when the state was in a recession. State aid gradually increased once the economy rebounded, however, the amount currently paid to libraries is prorated. according to House Fiscal Agency, it would cost \$15.2 M to provide full funding for libraries. According to advocates, the legislature should fully fund the libraries at the level established under PA 89 which is \$.50 per capita and fund cost of living increases that libraries have experienced since 1977.

I live six blocks from a large library - Delta Waverly Library. I consider our library more of a community center. People of all ages enjoy the standard library features but also the activities for people of all ages from children's enrichment activities to reading and research materials for young adults, adults and seniors. I have always lived within walking distance of libraries. As a child, I volunteered at the local library putting books back on the shelves.
